FEES AND METHODS OF PAYMENT
2018/2019 Academic Year

When accepting an offer of a place on an MA programme, you will be asked to pay a non-refundable registration fee of £100 to secure your place.

The fee for each of the three years of the MA programmes for students starting in 2018 is £2260, so the total fee for 3 years (excluding the registration fee) is £6780.

The fee for extending the period of study beyond the three year period of study is currently £645 per year (see Extension of Study Period below).

Fees are due at the beginning of September of each year. At the beginning of your programme, you can pay in full, which attracts a £150 discount if paid before 1 September 2018, or spread the payment of fees over the 3 years. If a student withdraws during the year, the fees due will be either the cost of the number of individual modules/dissertation started or the cost of number of academic years started, whichever is the greater.

The fees include classes, supervision, assessment, administration and use of the library.

The fee does not include meals or accommodation, for which a separate charge is made in advance of any module and payable, at the latest, two weeks before the start of the module. Modules can be taken on a residential or non-residential basis and the current package prices for the year commencing July 2017 are £232 (en-suite), £190 (standard) and £55 (non-residential) respectively. The College regrets that it cannot refund meals or accommodation not taken up. Hospitality is also charged on a pro-rata basis for other periods in College e.g. dissertation training events. Note: all fees and prices will be reviewed at the beginning of July each year.

You may pay the fees for the programme (excluding registration fee) by one of the following four methods:

1. By one lump sum of £6630*

*If the whole fee for the programme is paid before 1 September 2018, there is a discount of £150 i.e. £6630 to pay (NB: only available to students in their first year). Please make your payment payable to 'Sarum College'.

2. Three annual instalments of £2260

The instalments are payable:

1 September 2018, 1 September 2019, 1 September 2020

3. Six instalments of £1130

The instalments are payable:

1 September 2018, 1 March 2019, 1 September 2019, 1 March 2020,
1 September 2020 and 1 March 2021

4. Twenty six instalments: 1 payment of £1130, then twenty-five payments of £226

The instalments are payable:

2018/19 (six payments): One initial payment of £1130, payable on 1 September 2018; then £226 payable on 1 February 2019, 1 March 2019, 1 April 2019, 1 May 2019 and 1 June 2019.

2019/20 (ten payments): £226 payable on 1 September 2019, 1 October 2019, 1 November 2019, 1 December 2019, 1 January 2020, 1 February 2020, 1 March 2020, 1 April 2020, 1 May 2020 and 1 June 2020.

2020/21 (ten payments): £226 payable on 1 September 2020, 1 October 2020, 1 November 2020, 1 December 2020, 1 January 2021, 1 February 2021, 1 March 2021, 1 April 2021, 1 May 2021 and 1 June 2021.

Withdrawal from Study

If you withdraw from the course, you will be charged the full year fees for the number of years of study that you have commenced, plus any additional modules over and above 3 modules in year one, 6 modules in year two and 6 modules and the dissertation in year three. The date of withdrawal will be the date of receipt of a formal notification of withdrawal by the validating university.

Withdrawal of Course

While the College endeavours to run all advertised courses, it may occasionally be necessary to withdraw a programme of study. If this happens you will be notified at least 1 month before the start of the course and your £100 deposit will be refunded.

Extension to Period of Study

The fees are calculated on the following basis:

Postgraduate Certificate (60 credits)

Completed within 1 year of starting the course.

Postgraduate Diploma (120 credits)

Completed within 2 years of starting the course.

Masters Degree (180 credits)

Completed within 3 years of starting the course.

If you wish to extend your period of study beyond these periods there will be a charge of £645 per year of extension and will apply as follows :

Postgraduate Certificate – extension beyond 1 September 2019

Postgraduate Diploma – extension beyond 1 September 2020

Masters Degree – extension beyond 1 September 2021

Permission to extend modules and the dissertation must be applied for and granted by the Programme Leader.

Where a student withdraws from the course mid studies they may appeal for their outstanding fees as described above to be repealed. An appeal form is available from the course administrator. The appeal will be initiated by the receipt of the form by the course administrator.

Audit Fees

Students may attend modules in addition to those which they are studying for credit, by permission of the Programme Leader. The hospitality rates will be the usual student rates which are currently £232 (en-suite), £190 (standard) and £55 (non-residential) respectively, with an added educational fee of £100 per booking. Please note that students must give clear information on whether they are attending modules as part of their accredited study in advance of attendance. Should the module be oversubscribed, preference will be given to students taking the module for credit.

Note: all hospitality fees and prices will be reviewed at the beginning of July each year.

Other Costs

Please be aware that there will be other costs incurred by studying at Sarum College. Books may need to be purchased and the student must have access to, and be able to use, computer equipment (e.g. a PC/Mac and Microsoft Word software) as well as being able to regularly access the Internet. In addition, the requirements of submitting the dissertation involves printing and binding hard-copies (two) of the dissertation, for which there will be a fee payable direct to the binding company (as sourced by the student independently). Some modules have additional charges for supplementary resources or trips e.g. the MA in Christian Approaches to Leadership programme has an added fee of approximately £100

for the personality questionnaire exercise during the Personal Development optional module, which is to be paid before the start of that module, if selected. Where there is an additional fee, this will be specified in the module descriptor.

Academic Regulations

It is the student's responsibility to familiarise themselves thoroughly with, and adhere to, the Academic Regulations of our validating institution, the University of Winchester.

When accepting the offer of a place on a Sarum College MA programme (by signing the registration form) the student agrees to do so.
